To be a catalyst to improve well-being and prosperity in the Black community with sustained efforts to improve Black Maternal and Child Health outcomes, effectively unite and elevate the Black voice, and build sustainable infrastructure to strengthen Black capacity.

# BLACK MATERNAL HEALTH WEEK

We welcomed **318 attendees** to our one-of-a-kind Black Maternal Health Exhibit, encompassing various themes including the celebration of Black joy and autonomy.

Attendees had the opportunity to explore the history of Black birthwork and reproductive health, visiting the "All My Babies" historic film exhibit and the Black Reproductive Health Justice Timeline. We were honored to share stories illustrating real birth experiences from Central Valley women. We also showcased representative scientific illustrations, and held live simulations with our High-Fidelity Birthing Simulator, Olivia.

Regardless of the wind and rain, our Jubilee brought out 350 people! There was a lot of learning, eating, celebrating, and BIG GIVEAWAYS. We distributed strollers, cribs, electric breast pumps, breastfeeding supplies and MORE. We are thrilled to have served so many pregnant mamas! The event also featured amazing public health vendors who provided education and informational materials.

At the Black Maternal Health Symposium, we were honored to highlight stories from Candice and Tatiana. They shared how receiving support from Ta-She-Ra, Doula and BIH Program Coordinator, positively impacted their pregnancy and postpartum experiences.

The symposium's program highlighted efforts to improve maternal and infant health outcomes by key stakeholders such as Presenting Sponsor Anthem Blue Cross Medi-Cal, Voices for Birth Justice Fresno, CMQCC/Stanford, Saint Agnes Medical Center, Community Regional Medical Center, Kaiser, and our guest of honor, California Surgeon General Dr. Diana Ramos.

We awarded 4 doulas, Starr Gaines-Glynn, Christie Love, Danielle Cobb, and Ta-She-Ra Manning with their BDN doula certifications! This marks a significant milestone in their journey to support Black mamas and their families.

Black Maternal Health Week continues to serve as a catalyst, guiding BWPC's year-round efforts in policy advocacy, education, and community power-building.



# PROGRAM UPDATES



## BACKPACK GIVEBACK & FALL FOR HEALTH

In addition to BMHW, we hosted two free community resource events: a Backpack Giveback event, where we distributed 200 free backpacks filled with school supplies, and a Fall for Health Community Event, which provided health education and resources to families in West Fresno. Thanks to Saint Rest Baptist Church for hosting us every year!





#### BLACK INFANT HEALTH SATELLITE PROGRAM

This year, we completed the final cohort of our Black Infant Health (BIH) satellite program, supporting over 60 pregnant Black mothers and birthing persons with prenatal and postpartum care. While the program at BWPC has ended, many participants are still actively involved with our other events and programs.

#### BWPC CARE COORDINATION EXPANSION

In August, the African American Coalition (AAC) celebrated its first anniversary as a program under BWPC, bringing with it two key partnerships: Fresno County's Health Disparities (HD) Program and Fresno HOPE Pathways Community HUB (FCHIP). Funding from these partnerships enables our team of Community Health Advocates to assist families in accessing housing, healthcare, and other essential resources. In December, BWPC was recognized as FCHIP's Care Coordination Agency of the Year honoring our team's dedication and commitment to supporting the community.





#### GROWTH FOR THE BLACK DOULA NETWORK

We also saw progress with our BLACK Doula Network (BDN). Thanks to our partnership with Community Health System, our doula trainees completed 150 hospital observation hours! Four doulas were certified during BMHW, and three more doulas will be certified in 2025.

# YOTE FOR YOUR HEALTH

Campaign

Our Your Vote, Your Voice, Your Health Campaign reached 1,545 community members and our team distributed 4,141 education materials!

Throughout the campaign from June to November 2024, we trained and mobilized our doulas and CHWs to engage directly with community members. The campaign emphasized the crucial connection between voting and improving health outcomes, especially in areas severely impacted by structural racism and health disparities.

The American Medical Association acknowledges that voting is a Social Determinant of Health. By sharing relevant data on health outcomes, education resources, and information about voting registration, we help communities take the future of their health into their own hands.

# STRONG START& BEYOND

#### **Partnership**

In 2024 BLACK Wellness & Prosperity Center (BWPC) partnered with the California Surgeon General in support of the Strong Start & Beyond campaign. This groundbreaking movement, launched by California Surgeon General Dr. Diana E. Ramos, with the support of First Partner Jennifer Siebel Newsom, Christopher Carey, General Manager of Calm Health, and Secretary Xavier Becerra, U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, aims to reduce California's maternal mortality rate 50% by December 2026 through enhanced awareness, access to resources, and community engagement.

BWPC's commitment goes beyond raising awareness, with a focus on implementing culturally congruent system improvements and fostering power-sharing with Black women throughout their reproductive journeys.

BWPC's efforts include education, advocacy, and research collaborations with institutions such as Stanford University, alongside community-driven initiatives aimed at reducing health disparities in maternal and infant care. By leveraging partnerships and encouraging active participation in health decisions, BWPC continues to drive systemic improvements that benefit not only the Central Valley but also the wider population of California.

As California's maternal mortality rates remain disproportionately high among Black mothers, Strong Start & Beyond is a necessary movement to help close the gap, save lives, and create lasting change. As dedicated partners, BWPC remains committed to ensuring that no Black mother or baby dies from preventable causes.

In 2024, BLACK Wellness & Prosperity Center achieved a record-breaking milestone, securing \$4.91 million in funding across more than 30 grants. These investments strengthen our programs, expand our reach, and build long-term sustainability.
