## **PREGNANCY & IMMUNIZATIONS**

Vaccines, screenings, and immunizations are vital parts of pregnancy care:

- Pregnant women's resistance to infections lowers during pregnancy. This makes them more likely to get certain viruses. If infected, they can also get more sick, especially if they already suffer from health issues such as asthma
- Vaccines during pregnancy protect you and your baby!
  Your body makes antibodies in response to the vaccines and you pass some of these antibodies to your baby



#### **GET THE TDAP VACCINE - EARLY 3. TRIMESTER**

- The Tdap vaccine protects you and your baby from 3 infections: Tetanus (T), Diphteria (D), and PERTUSSIS (aP) also called the "whooping cough"
- Diphteria and the whooping cough are highly contagious, and all 3 diseases can lead to serious organ failure or health problems
- If you are pregnant, get this vaccine during each pregnancy
- Talk to your provider about getting the Tdap vaccine between 27 and 36 weeks of pregnancy, even if you got one before you got pregnant

#### **GET THE FLU SHOT - ANY TRIMESTER**

- Flu is a contagious respiratory illness that can develop into complications such as pneumonia
- There are many types of flu shots, your doctor will help you get the type that is right for you
- You can get the flu shot during any trimester of pregnancy

#### **GET VACCINATED AGAINST COVID-19**

- COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective before, during, and after pregnancy
- 1 updated Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine is advised for everyone who is 6 months or older

## **GET THE VACCINE AGAINST RSV - 3. TRIMESTER**

- RSV is respiratory infection that causes mild, cold-like symptoms
- Abrysvo is the first vaccine approved for use in pregnant people to prevent lower respiratory tract disease (LRTD) and severe LRTD caused by RSV
- Getting the vaccine between 32-36 weeks of pregnancy helps protect your baby through the first 6 months of life

# YOU MAY NEED OTHER VACCINES TO PROTECT YOURSELF AND YOUR BABY.

Ask your provider about Hepatitis B & Hepatitis C vaccines, screenings and other recommended vaccines based on your age, state of health, and health record.
